

PLANTING FOR PLAY

Jane Urquart

Native area: <u>SELECTIONS</u> of particular natives

Melicytus dentatus/Tree Violet – slow/20 yrs, but weeping habit to suggest natural cubbies with shrub or Poa lab. plantings grouped in front & mulched

Others to consider: <u>Leptospermum</u> pertersonii 4, L. laevigatum 3, L. lanigerum 3, L. polygalifolium 4, <u>Callistemon</u> viminalis 5, C. salignus (Willow) 8, <u>Acacia sp</u> – iteaphylla 5(Flinders Ranges), uncinata 3(Weeping), vestita 4 (Hairy); <u>Agonis flexuosa</u> 7 & nana 1 - slow; <u>Kunzea</u> ambigua 3; <u>Melaleuca</u> incana 2.5, M. ericifolia 4:

<u>Grasses/Lilliaceae</u> - <u>Poa</u> labillardieri 0.8-1 + <u>Themeda</u> australis 0.5-1 + <u>Lomandra</u> longifolia 1-1.5, L. longifolia 'Tanika' 0.6,

<u>Dianella</u> tasmanica 0.5, <u>caerulea</u> 1(Paroo Lily); <u>Orthrosanthus</u> multiflorus 0.75; <u>Anigozanthus</u> cultivars & hybrids – flavidus/rufus 1-2 (prefer taller ones more vigorous/stronger)

Shrubs - Eriostemon myoporoides 2,

Thryptomene calycina 2

Correa reflexa (Common) 3, alba (White) 2, baeuerlenii (Chef's Cap) 2, glabra (Rock) 2

Adenanthos sericea 7 - Woollybush

Banksia marginata 10 (Silver), integrifolia 15 (Coast), spinulosa 1-4(Hairpin) – also possible for climbing

Melaleuca incana – Grey Honey Myrtle, 2.5 m high, prefers sunny/moist & tolerates dryness; hedging, screening, birds, good climbing when mature

<u>Others to consider</u>: <u>Hakea</u> laurina 6; H. salicifolia – Willow-leafed; <u>Westringia</u> fruiticosa & cvs 1.5; <u>Acacia</u> acinacea (Gold Dust) 2, Chamaleuceum uncinatum (Geraldton Wax Flower)

Small Eucalyptus – forrestiana (Fuchsia) 5; preissiana (Bell-fruited Mallee) 3, torquata 9 (Coral) 10; caesia 'Silver Princess' 8m

<u>Leucophyta</u> brownii (Cushion Bush) 1; <u>Brachycome</u> multifida (Cut-leaf) 0.40, <u>Chrysocephalum</u> apiculatum (Common Everlasting) 0.30; <u>Chorizema</u> cordatum (Heart-leaved Flame Pea) 1;

Rainforest path – rose garden right, perennial border left

Tagetes lemmonii – flowers for picking

Backhousia citriodora – 6-8 m, shade, bush food (Lemon Myrtle), humus-rich/moist soil during dry periods

Perennial border:

Stachys lanata

Salvia waverly – 1.2 m, full sun/pt. shade, continuous flowering

Miscanthus spp.

Canna lilies

Others to consider: Limonium perezii (Statice) 0.5; Perrenial Basil (Ocimum spp.) 1; Felecia angustifolia/amelloides

Across lawn:

<u>Ulmus</u> parvifolia – 18m, spreading, shade, decorative bark;

Others trees/tall shrubs to consider: Jacaranda, Agonis flexuosa 7; Lillypillys; Prunus spp., Ornamental Pears (selections with a good spreading/horizontal canopy), Crab apples, Acer negundo, , Lagerstromia, Magnolia grandiflora, Brachychiton populneus

Arbutus x andrachnoides – hybrid is sterile; others: edible fruit but not palatable, tolerates dry summer

Around to Herb Garden past L'scape construction building:

Aeoniums & Fairy Crassula etc – example of succulents

Bamboo clumping & running (good in v. compacted areas) – all need lots of water

Buddlia salvifolia, alternifolia, davidii – 3-4m, full sun, well-drained, butterfly attracting,

Scented pelargoniums - lemon scented, chocolate, rose, etc

Herbs - Rosemary - Lavender - Oregano - Thyme - culinary Sage

Salvia dorisana – 1-1.3 m, Fruit scented or Peach Sage, winter flowering

Salvia fruitescens – Pinapple Sage, flowers during winter

+ Salvia leucantha – velvety purple flowers

Mints

Heliotrope arborescens – 1 m, full sun, fragrant flowers

Abutilon megapotamicum – prostrate or shrub form, 2.4 m, arching, sun, some water in summer

Euryops pectinatus – 1.2 m, some moisture/dry periods, winter-spring flowering – yellow daisies/picking

& Argyranthemun frutescens cultivars – Marguerites; 1 m, cut-flower, long-flowering/picking

Around to Orchard gate:

Prunus mume 'Pendula' – Japanese apricot as an example of grafted/weeping shrubs for cubbies; Others – Mulberry, Ornamental Weeping Cherries

Cercis siliquastrum – 8, drought tolerant, stick with the species which is hardier than the selected cultivars (Forest Pansy etc)

Doryanthes palmeri 3m, moist, well-drained, some shade, bird attracting if space allows

Old car-park border:

Nandina domestica – 1.8m, clumping, upright stems, male & female plants required to produce berries (some are hermaphrodites), needs some shade, fertile soil

Ceratostigma willmottianum – 0.5-1.2 m, late summer/autumn, sun/part shade, lilac-blue flowers for picking

- + Streptosolen jamesonii 1.8 m, arching stems, bright orange flowers for picking
- + Phlomis friuticosus (Jerusalem Sage) 1-1.5 yellow flowers for picking
- + Leonotis leonuris orange flowers for picking
- + Hebes require summer watering, flowers for picking

Others to consider:

Olives, Pomegranates, Feijoas, Strawberry Guavas, Persimmons, Lemons, Mandarins, Blueberries, Passionfruit
